## Provincial Election

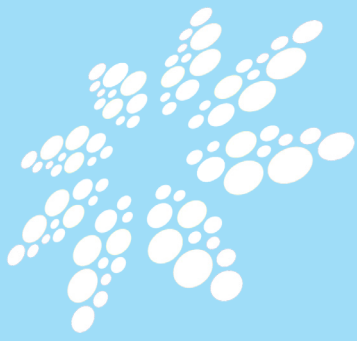

## ACADEMIC ADVOCACY: APPEALS

Drop dates are important. Ignorance of course withdrawal dates is increasingly grounds to deny appeals for retroactive withdrawals. There are several ways that you can keep on top of drop dates.

These dates are available on the University's website and your courses' outline. Many instructors also post the dates on Nexus. Recording these dates in your schedule or on your phone's calendar can be a simple and effective reminder.

It's important to note that you are entitled to have 20% of your work marked and returned to you by the Voluntary Withdrawal day. If this has not happened, speak to your instructor and an academic advisor. It may be grounds for an appeal.

Finally, if you're thinking about dropping a course, speak with your instructor. Often instructors are a good source of advice about how a course is going and what your best options are.

## U-PASS

The UWSA is working closely with Winnipeg Transit and the University of Winnipeg to ensure the roll out of the UPass for Fall 2016 goes smoothly. We have received a working draft of the three-way agreement, and have voiced our input to Winnipeg Transit and anticipate a mutually beneficial agreement will be finalized in the Spring.

## FIGHT FOR \$15

This Friday, students and workers from across the city will be gathering together on the U of W's front lawn at 12:00 noon to rally for a living wage. We're calling for government and employers to shift from paying minimum wages, to a \$15 per hour standard that allows people to meet their basic needs and lifts workers out of poverty.

At our own University, hundreds of markers, teaching assistants, research assistants, tutors, lab demonstrators and other employees earn close to the minimum wage of \$11 per hour. With the cost of rent, food, textbooks and tuition fees rising faster than the minimum wage, this is not nearly enough. Now is the time for a living wage of \$15 per hour.
