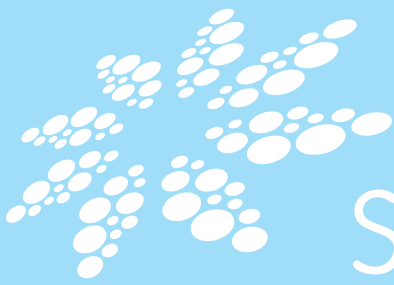

# JOIN THE STUDENT MOVEMENT

## UWSA DAY CARE EXPANSION

With 10% of UW undergraduates identifying as student parents, access to affordable childcare on campus is essential. In order to meet this need, the UWSA operates a 96-space daycare centre for students, faculty, and community members. In light of an already long waitlist, and the number of student parents likely to increase in the coming years, it's clear that additional childcare spaces are needed to meet current and future demand. The more spaces we can provide, the more accessible pursuing an education at the University of Winnipeg becomes.

To address this, we're working to pursue a \$1 million, 32-space expansion of our UWSA Day Care. As infant spaces are in highest demand, twenty of these spaces will be reserved for infants. With the UWSA providing \$450,000 and the University pledging \$150,000 in support of the project, we are waiting to hear whether or not the provincial government will provide a \$400,000 grant that will allow construction to proceed. Assuming the funding is received, we're hopeful that the expansion will be complete by Spring 2017.

## CONSENT CULTURE ON CAMPUS:

## INDIGENOUS CREDIT REQUIREMENT

The Indigenous Credit Requirement (ICR) will require all students completing an undergraduate degree at the University of Winnipeg to include a 3 credit-hour course in which the greater part of the content is local Indigenous material. The ICR was approved by the University of Winnipeg Senate on Friday November 20, 2015 and will be implemented in Fall 2016. Students registered prior to the 2016-2017 academic year will not be affected.

Moving forward, we see an opportunity for the University of Winnipeg to act as a leader challenging our community and reaffirming the social obligation of those who work and study here on Treaty 1 territory.

We also do not presume to have answers to some of the difficult questions that we will face as we move forward.

We believe that this initiative will add value to the education offered by the University, but we encourage all voices to join the conversation, especially those who feel alternative paths forward must be taken instead.

The advice of the Indigenous Advisory Circle, as well as Indigenous academics and thought leaders, will guide all our actions as we move forward. We commit to being partners with Indigenous communities, walking together towards a peaceful future.

As the representative body of students on campus, we begin this process in recognition of the role that we must play in creating a learning environment that is accepting and welcoming for all our members. We begin the process of embracing an active role in Indigenous our institution's learning environment that we wish to study and work within.

## ADVOCACY

Have a problem? We do advocacy. Whether it's an unfair grade, a bad interaction with an instructor or students, or a housing incident, and whatever the issue, the UWSA can help by providing advocacy and insight into university policies and procedures.

The thing about advocacy is that students often don't know they have available resources to support them or how to access these resources.

If you find yourself needing advocacy, contacting the UWSA is a great place to start. As a student, you are a member of the Students' Association and are entitled to many benefits. One of the benefits is advocacy. The VP Student Affairs deals specifically with University related advocacy, and the UWSA is positioned to support you in two key ways: 1) we are included through University processes on most committees that affect student appeals; 2) our function is to represent your interests, and we can use our position to influence processes and decisions.

A few examples of advocacy we have dealt with this year include arranging a meeting between a student, instructor, and the Department Chair regarding a conflict in the classroom allowing everyone to come to a mutual understanding and set of expectations. We have sent emails on behalf of students relaying concerns about instructors' grades and conduct to the appropriate Deans and Chairs.

As an organization, we are in a position to argue for the approval of Retroactive Withdrawals, Deferred Exams, Incompletes, and other appeals through academic advising.

When something goes awry, the UWSA is here to work to help find a better solution and ensure the University follows policy and procedures appropriately leading to outcomes that are consistent and fair.
